WOOF YEAR REVIEW

WOOF has had another successful year with 6 issues being produced and circulated free. Some 800 copies are circulated, and we are very grateful to the circulators!

Financially the printing costs rose but the advertisement charges were unchanged, so we made a loss of some £550. But we have a positive balance in the bank of over £2,000 brought forward from previous years.

The advertising rates have been increased for 2024 but the aim of returning the frequency to monthly is unlikely for the immediate future.

The advertising in 2023 raised £7327 and posted copies £10. The printing and editing costs £7440.

The website postage and fees £447.35. Deficit £550.35.

OCKLEY WAR MEMORIALS

There are two war memorials in the village to those who died in the 1st and 2nd World Wars. One in St Margaret's church and the second in the Village Hall which was built as a memorial for the 1st World War. The kitchen building in the Village Hall was built as the memorial for the 2nd World War.

The Village Hall has photographs of those who died as well as a painting of John Lee Steere whose parents funded the building of the Hall. There are many interesting decorative features including a stone from the Cloth Hall at Ypres, which was destroyed in the fighting and a Grenadier Cap Badge in the brickwork. John Lee Steere was killed at Ypres and was in the Grenadier Guards as was Alfred Butcher, also killed at Ypres.

Briony Thomas did a fantastic job researching the names on the War Memorials and each year on Armistice Day, Iris Spruce has copies on display in the Village Hall. Do go and visit!

BUT there are some missing. Dick Thomas has produced notes Briony was working on and it should be possible to have a complete set, though not to the standard that Briony produced!

Many people are commemorated on several war memorials but those on the Ockley memorials have some connection with Ockley. Percy Banfield is not on the St Margaret's memorial as he died in 1923 after the tablet was put up.

Briony had not had time to complete a similar exercise for those commemorated on the 2nd World War Memorials. Again, Dick has produced Briony's notes. There are several names included who have family still living in the Village. **CAN READERS HELP?** The names are Alfred Bennett, Peter Elms, Thomas Fairs, Reginald Hewer, Archie Holden, Michael Major, Tom Mitchell, Douglas Rands, Peter Rodwell and Basil Roger-Smith. I have details of my father Charles Lee Steere.

INNOVATIVE DEMENTIA DAY CARE ENTERPRISE DOUBLES ITS CAPACITY

Tapestry Day Club (TDC), which provides day care for people living with early-stage dementia in its hosts' family homes, is effectively doubling in size. Five new hosts have just completed its comprehensive training programme.

West-Sussex-based cofounder Anderley Wade said: "This means we are able to support many more people, also in new areas, thereby providing much-needed respite for their carers, too."

It has been proven that you can slow the progress of dementia by reducing 12 risk factors – by as much as 40%*. Infrequent



social contact is one of those risk factors.

"That is why I founded TDC with my friend Clare Jones from Surrey in 2019. If this service had been available when my Dad became ill with dementia, it would have improved his quality of life and he would have been able to stay at home longer," said Anderley.

What makes this not-for-profit company different is that it offers:

- Day care within hosts' family homes.
- Transport, if needed.
- Small group sizes, a maximum of six.
- Regular club days, allowing friendships to flourish. It operates on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays, with some hosts working up to three days per week.
- Optional memory-boosting activities tailored to the interests of individual guests.
- A hot, home-cooked, two course lunch, with menus catering to the tastes of guests.

An expert's experience

Sussex dementia healthcare professional Penny Dodds, whose mother was a member of Tapestry Day Club for more than six months until she moved into a care home, said:

"Tapestry's approach of viewing people as having rich life experiences and engaging people is to be commended. It is social inclusion at its best for dementia care. It helped my Mother remain at home, keeping her active, lively, independent and socially engaged.

"The importance of eating with others cannot be underestimated. My Mother is a widow. With few cues to eat, she had lost weight. Once she started at Tapestry, her face filled out, back to how it was.

"The host's gentle, subtle ways of communicating shows her skill and understanding of the challenges faced by people with dementia. I am immensely grateful and humbled. It is also extraordinarily good value for money. A truly person-centred service."

NET ZERO VILLAGE CHURCHES

Following the lead of the central Church of England, the PCC of Capel and Ockley has adopted a Net Zero Carbon statement in their meeting of 8 November. PCC members and members of the congregation (and the wider community!) can hold their life and work against the light of this statement:

'The Parish of Capel and Ockley, Church of England, is committed to reaching Net Zero Carbon by 2030. To achieve this requires action by all parts of our Church. The priority is to reduce the emissions arising from the energy use of our buildings, our transport and the activities we run as a church.'

In recent years, even before thinking about the 2030 deadline, our churches have come a long way:

- Both St John the Baptist and St Margaret's are registered ECO churches (<u>www.ecochurch.arocha.org.uk</u>) with a bronze award, each looking for the best way to reach silver.
- Both churches have a new low-energy lighting system indoors and out and are on a green tariff for electricity. Lights are also automatically switched off when not in use.
- LOAF (Local, Organic, Animal-friendly, Fair trade) goods are on sale regularly in both churches and at all our events we strive to offer vegetarian options, organic coffee and tea and more.

In the course of 2024 you can expect more specific plans from the PCC and information on how you too can reduce your personal carbon footprint.

Here's to an exciting new year!

THE GARDEN IN JANUARY AND FEBRUARY

The start of the new year provides a quieter and more sedate 'pause' in the gardening year. January is a wonderful month for all us gardeners – both amateur and professional - to **take stock of the green spaces** we nurture. Whether sitting indoors in front of a cosy fire or escaping into the fresh air to work off some Christmas cake, it's a great time to **reflect** on the past year and to **start making plans** for the gardening year ahead.

More importantly than ever, the start of **THIS** new year is a perfect time for us all to make some **environmentally responsible** new year gardening resolutions. These might include:

- back (or stopping) buying compost containing peat (and buying it by the load rather than individual bags if you have the space to store it).
- recycling and reusing garden plastics wherever possible.
- creating wildlife havens within our gardens, from putting up a nesting box in a small garden to developing a 're-wilded' area if you have more space to play with.
- collecting water wherever you can, in water butts or any other suitable large containers (that can also be used by wildlife).
- building new or improving your compost area to maximise garden waste recycling, including building a simple wire structure for collected leaves to rot down.

There are many other ways we can do our bit so use this early part of the year to google ideas, read gardening magazines and ask gardening friends for suggestions.

Winter is a good time to **plan** which vegetables you are going to grow and where you are going to grow them. Make sure to choose veg you will actually eat! Plan a rotation system to ensure the same crops are not grown in the same beds to help prevent disease build-up.

This winter hiatus provides a perfect opportunity for a good **clean** and sharpen of tools, as well as a **tidy and sort** of that green house and potting shed you've been meaning to do all year. You can get pots and seed trays ready for **sowing**, starting with sowing seed indoors (or in a heated greenhouse or propagator) for early crops like lettuce, summer brassicas (e.g. cabbages and cauliflowers), spinach, salad onions and turnips. From mid-February onwards, sow tomato and cucumber seed for greenhouse growing. Source your seed potatoes if you have not already done so. Save egg boxes as they will come in handy for chitting a little later on. You can also start to sow sweet peas indoors or in a greenhouse. For when you do want to **get out and active** in your garden, there are always some jobs to do at this time of year. Many plants benefit from a **winter prune**, including established wisteria (shortening shoots that were summer pruned back to two to three buds). Also prune apple trees (not cordons), and currants and gooseberries need to be trimmed by about a third, cutting out crossing branches.

Moving through February, **prune** *late*-flowering (group 3) clematis, grasses, cornus and shrub roses. And unless the ground is frozen or waterlogged, January and February are good months to **plant** dormant deciduous shrubs and trees. Buying bare root plants at this time of year is often a good value option.

Finally, it's not too early to think about what you might want to enter for the **Okewood**, **Ockley and Forest Green Summer Fair**. The best traditional Summer Fair is, as always, in Okewood Hill on **Saturday 10th August 2024**.

Plant of the month – Hellebore (remove old and brown leaves that might hide emerging flowers)

OCKLEY DRAMATIC SOCIETY SHOWS 2023

Back in October 2023 the Ockley Dramatic Society performed two one-act plays at Ockley Village Hall. The following article gives an unusual perspective as well as a synopsis of what you may have missed.

Serom the Prompter's chair

Imagine you are at a performance of a play. You are not in the audience. You are not a member of the cast, yet you are sitting on the stage, but no one can see you. Not seen and hopefully not heard, who are you? You are the prompter, part of the team that helps everything run smoothly. Your job is to follow every word spoken by every actor so that if anyone forgets a word or a line, you can supply it to them in such a way that the performance continues seamlessly.

This is quite a responsibility. One lapse in concentration and you can lose your place, making you quite unable to supply the word exactly when it is needed. Attending numerous rehearsals helps you to learn the play and get familiar with it along with the cast. It is important to understand the stage directions so that you know when there is no dialogue, and you do not prompt when it is not required. Members of the cast will give you more precise guidance with this, especially when there is a deliberate silence, to emphasise the last line.

This experience gives you a much deeper understanding of the play. As a member of the audience, you would not have read it or heard it in advance, and you would not be aware of the detailed preparation that goes into the public performance. Each actor brings their own talent and interpretation of the part they have to play, whilst the director tells them how to deliver certain key lines and how to interact with other members of the cast.

Then there is the stage management, the props, and the costumes as well as the lighting, sound effects and the incidental music. Within a strict budget, each of these aspects must be right. Being part of the community, the Ockley Dramatic Society knows how and where to get the materials it needs and each of us knows what has to be done to set the stage and prepare the Hall.

The prompter gets inside knowledge of every aspect of the production and benefits from getting to know the team. As with every endeavour, preparation is key. Are there any risks? It is possible to overthink the narrative and make fanciful interpretations of the story, but if the director and even the author are on hand, that is not likely to last long! It's a great experience watching the transformation of a written text into a live, dramatic performance. The following reviews are based on the experience of being the prompter through five rehearsals and three performances at the end of which the cast was word perfect. The two plays were performed on three nights at the end of October as part of the continuing celebration of the Ockley Dramatic Society's 75th Anniversary.

🔁 Returned Empty

Violet Casey is an experienced manager of an off-licence in the 1990s. Mrs. Casey has already met all sorts of customers, but now she is confronted with by far the most awkward.

Within the first minute of this play, Mrs. Casey and Renee, her young assistant, meet a customer whose name is never mentioned, but who is referred to as 'Ciderman'



because of the bizarre transaction he wants to make.

Ciderman makes three visits in all to the off-licence, each one more exasperating to Mrs. Casey and Renee. It gradually transpires that he has two hundred empty cider bottles which he claims he bought from them and for which he wants a refund on the empties.

First, he produces two empty bottles which Mrs. Casey is confident he hadn't bought from her. Renee (who is good at maths) points out that the refund would only be eight pence. Ciderman loses his temper and makes a very unpleasant threat. The atmosphere lightens on the arrival of PC Turner who comes in to buy crisps and a Coke.

As Mrs. Casey and Renee try to make sense of what has happened, Ciderman is back. This time, he starts with an apology and an offer to bring up bottles from the stock room. Already cautious, Mrs. Casey accepts but decides to go with him. As they approach the stock room, Ciderman doubles back, grabs the key to the door and locks her in. Renee returns and realises what Ciderman is doing. She demands the key and refuses to open the till and let Ciderman take the money he thinks he is owed. Luckily, PC Turner returns in the middle of the resulting tussle between



Ciderman and Renee, calms them down and rescues Mrs. Casey. PC Turner, an avuncular policeman with a Baldrick-type voice, makes Ciderman leave and then gets out his pocketbook and pencil to start a report. He begins by questioning Mrs. Casey who protests, pointing out that he has let the suspect go.

Ciderman returns, this time with a bunch of flowers as a peace offering. Mrs. Casey, still indignant, tells him to go but relents when he offers to make a purchase. Then Renee suggests that Ciderman take all the bottles to the bottle bank, an idea to which he warms, finally adopting it as his own. He leaves the off-licence.

PC Turner unguardedly reveals Ciderman's entire Police record going back to his university days. Just as Mrs. Casey begins to help PC Turner with his report, Ciderman is spotted approaching the off-licence with a wheelbarrow full of the empties. As he gets closer, he starts throwing the bottles at the off-licence, breaking the windows, and showering them with glass. The last thing we hear is Ciderman chuckling.

🛯 A Slice of Life

A Slice of Life is set in the Ruby Rocket Diner where the menu boasts "Heavenly Food at a Devilishly Good Price".

This American play, cleverly adapted for a British audience, ostensibly portrays the everyday lives of two couples, a wayward politician and a youngish reporter who has been lured there by a shadowy figure called Lucifer.

Whilst the two couples wrestle with their tangled relationships, Diane the reporter, joins Lucifer who has invited her for what Diane thinks is an interview. Lucifer says it is not an interview: she only wants to speak with her.

As the waitress Pat mops up some spilled water, Lucifer leans over to help. The sudden move scares Diane who produces an iron bar and hurriedly explains that you need protection from the actual devil. But then a Crucifix might have afforded protection says Lucifer. This is our first clue to the real identity of Lucifer, which we had no reason to suspect because her name hasn't been mentioned up to this point.

Diane perceptively says, "David Berkowitz thought he was sane". The audience may or may not know that Berkowitz was a serial killer. Then the references become more precise making it clear that we should think of Lucifer as the devil incarnate. Lucifer seems to know everything about Diane.

Gradually we realise that Lucifer is saying Steve's words as she is in a state in which her personal identity is suppressed. Eventually, Steve and Claire

(one of the two couples) continue a normal conversation. Then, Lucifer looks at the other couple, Todd and Jean and reveals the complications in their relationship.

Malick the politician enters to collect his order of cheeseburgers. Lucifer tells Diane that his presence suggests he is up to no good, which could be a scoop item for her and her



newspaper. Malick takes a call in a very amorous way, answering "Hey Gorgeous". He rapidly changes his tone when he has to take a call from his wife and misleads her about what he is doing. Diane eavesdrops on these conversations.

Lucifer tells Diane that Malick has begun an affair with an intern. Diane thinks she should tail him to pursue the big story, but Lucifer warns her that although it could be very profitable, it isn't the only option, and she should wait.

Steve decides that this is the moment to carry out his plan to offer Claire an engagement ring. It doesn't go well. Claire feels she is being ambushed and rejects him. Malick cynically comments that marriage isn't all it's cracked up to be. He should know.

Lucifer tells Diane that everything is now in place for her to choose the right path. The choice (which she says is also the subject of a bet between Lucifer and God) is either to pursue Malick or save Steve from suicide which she thinks is likely following his rejection by Claire, and which is potentially a bigger story. Ever canny, Diane asks why she (Lucifer) doesn't intervene and if not her, then the big one (God).

Lucifer says you must live by your own decisions and their consequences. Diane doesn't know what to do. She says no one ever did anything for her, tells Lucifer to go to hell and rushes off.

Pat sits down with Lucifer and admits she lost the bet, which Lucifer gladly accepts.

Pat says, "you don't have to be so smug about it" and Lucifer replies "hardly my fault, you made me this way".

Get it?
