OCKLEY HISTORY

I try to continue Bryony's occasional notes on extracts from old parish magazines. In the archives there are copies of Ockley magazines from 1884 to 1899, There are also scanned copies from 1900 to 1924 and then hard copies from 1942 up to date, though there a few gaps. The old ones mostly relate to church matters and are combined with neighbouring parishes in hardback volumes.

January 1895 issue records the repairs and enlargement to the St Margaret's Organ executed by the original builder Mr Hilditch at the expense of Colonel Calvert. The organ was originally installed in 1873 when St Margaret's was extended and reordered.

January 1896 records expenditure on enlarging Ockley School. And there is a splendid paragraph in the Capel section complaining about excess of zeal by some of the congregation's singing, in particular not keeping time with the organ and the choir.

Football results are also recorded. January 1899 reports Ockley beating Capel 3 to nil.

December 1924 records the retirement of the Rector Rev Frederick Marshall.

By January 1975 the Ockley Magazine is a separate pamphlet of 8 pages.

The Rector, Maurice Collins was in a very pessimistic mood. He quotes Jeremiah as being a realist not a pessimist or prophet of doom, but the continues 'the morale of our country has never been at a lower ebb. Patriotism is almost a dirty word. The virtues of honesty and integrity are fast disappearing. ... Looking beyond our own shores, we see countries

With problems similar to our own.... Above all there is the sinister build-up of Soviet armed might.' Some would say little changes!

The annual magazine subscription was 60p or £1.02 by post.

Ockley School visited Ockley Court Farm twice to study Dairy Farming.

Only 3 games of football were played because of wet weather. All were lost!

April 1975 records that work has started on the Ockley Housing Association site in Cricketers Close.

REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION

I occasionally receive request for information from the archives. They are stored in boxes indexed by Bryony but most requests relate to dates which need searching the collection of magazines which is very time consuming! The latest request concerned aircraft crashes during second world war. Can any reader help with more details and confirm the dates? A Heinkel 111 that crashed at Place Farm, south of Ockley in March 1941, also, a P-51 Mustang that crashed at Fishfold Farm west of Ockley on March 20th 1944 or 45.

I know of two other similar events. A flying bomb (doodle bug) which fell on the village green outside Lime Tree Cottages presumably in 1945 and a stick of bombs dropped on fields north of Eversheds Farm. But no date!

I also need help to complete the details of the people on the Ockley War Memorial. Bryony did a fantastic job completing the details of 18 from WW1. But there are 20 photographs in the Village Hall and 31 names on the War Memorial in the Church. And there are 11 names from WW2.

We would all rather donate a raffle prize of a handsome Teddy Bear to make certain that every family has a Teddy Bear thought the rest of the Friends.


Top Hat agreed, wholeheartedly. Certainly, Beatrice Bunny was now feeling

UPDATE FROM WIENERBERGER

Ewhurst brick and tileworks Community Liaison Committee

The recent community liaison committee (CLC) held on 12th September 2024 was attended by representatives from Surrey County Council, Mole Valley District Council, Abinger Parish Council, Ewhurst & Ellens Green Parish Council, Okewood Hill Residents Association, Rowhook and Clemsfold Amenity Society, and company representatives from Wienerberger.

The Works Manager was happy to report that demand for Keymer roof tiles is high, although brick sales were lower than hoped. In the previous update we reported that the factory's scrubber, a piece of equipment that removes emissions from the kiln exhaust which is vented high to atmosphere via a chimney stack for dilution and dispersal, had required an extensive repair. Since repairs were completed, a third-party emissions test has been conducted and the factory is once again complaint with its permit. The brickworks management has updated the operating procedures to prevent future breakdowns of the scrubber equipment.

The voluntary one-way system for HGVs continues to work well and compliance is monitored by staff at the brickworks in addition to receiving residents' reports. There were only two HGVs associated with Wienerberger reported not using the agreed route. Over the last few years there has been significant progress made by the brickworks and its contracted hauliers, to keep HGVs travelling in the same direction which ultimately makes the narrow roads safer for all to use.

Wienerberger still plans to install ground mounted solar panels in its field behind the factory. The proposed scheme is a 1.4 MW system comprising 4,000 solar panels which could supply around a quarter of the factory's electricity demand per year, and up to 80% of the electricity demand in the summer when generating at full capacity. This is well shielded by woodland and would only be visible from a footpath which runs along the site boundary. A planning application has recently been submitted to Surrey CC and will be available to view on their planning portal in due course.

The factory held a National Trust Heritage Open Day on 7th September 2024, which was attended by 150 people. Over winter Wienerberger is constructing a new wildlife garden with habitats dedicated to supporting reptile populations, as newts, slow worms and lizards have been recorded in the locale.

Ewhurst brick and tileworks Community Liaison Committee (CLC) is a gathering of residents, councillors, council regulators and staff at Wienerberger. Members come together three times per year to discuss the interaction of the Ewhurst brick and tileworks operations with the local community. The discussions span a variety of issues and can include

everything from supporting community groups and local events, to environmental monitoring and HGV traffic management in and around the factory. Members can recommend topics for the agenda according to their interests.

In between the CLC meetings, members are encouraged to share points of interest with their neighbours and the broader community through whichever channels are accessible to them. These conversations help residents understand more about Wienerberger's operations in their local area and in turn the feedback provided to Wienerberger helps the company to positively contribute to the local community and swiftly address any concerns if they arise.

A Happy New Year to Everyone

Bells are the largest and loudest instrument in the world. They are also the perfect way to get gentle physical exercise. Bellringing is open to everyone, young and old, with any level of fitness. Whilst bells can weigh up to 4,500 kg most are much lighter and are rung using mainly technique rather

than strength. The movement associated with bell ringing has been shown to improve agility, co-ordination, reaction time, balance, muscle endurance and cardiovascular fitness.

Pulling a rope may look like hard work but actually it's more about having good rhythm. Stretching up tones core abdominal muscles and glutes and the downwards rope pulling action improves the upper body strength while working biceps, quads and calves with minimal force. Bellringing also requires you to think and use your memory, keeping the mind active at the same time.

Ringing is well within the capabilities of most people but it is a universal truth that the older you get the more difficult it is to acquire a new skill. Research shows though that there are many benefits to learning something new and keeping the mind and body active. Ringing is also a very sociable activity where many new friendships are made. The band of ringers have to collaborate to achieve a common goal and fit together particularly in terms of the sound heard outside and being considerate of the neighbours.

There is a clear path of progression when learning to ring, with some overlap: first, bell handling such that you can ring independently without a helper standing nearby, then bell control to keep the bell striking in the right place. Once these skills are mastered there is the added difficulty of ringing with others, keeping your place ringing in rounds and then to be able to follow simple call changes. At this stage we move on to the building blocks for method ringing. Not all ringers want to go beyond call changes but the keener ones will find there is always something new to achieve and a supportive community ready to assist those willing to make the effort.

Anyone interested in finding out more is welcome to come along and have a go, under supervision, or just to watch. Practice nights are at St Margaret's Ockley on Wednesday evenings from 7.45pm to 9pm. If you decide to take it further then individual sessions are arranged at a mutually convenient time and handling a bell can be achieved in as little as a few hours.

The Hen Party

Our own playwright Wendy Freeman wrote and directed this play which is about preparations for bride to be Cheryl's hen party in New York.

The Dramatic Society showed its resilience and imagination when, two days before the first performance, Eliza Bennett who had been rehearsing the key role of Cheryl, was obliged to withdraw for pressing family reasons. Enter Vee Hardy, who agreed to take on the role, did some rapidly improvised rehearsals and did a great job. We are indebted to her.

It is September 2001. Cheryl and her party are due to land in New York on the morning of the eleventh. From the large calendar on the wall of the family lounge to the constant references to New York, the Big Apple, the plane tickets and attractions such as the Empire State Building, the audience can be in no doubt that something must be about to happen.

As they wait for the taxi to Heathrow, Cheryl and her sister Melanie get increasingly exasperated as their mother Connie fusses over their travel arrangements. Their father, Jeremy, makes token efforts to calm things down.

Unexpectedly, Barry, Cheryl's fiancé arrives. He has just enjoyed his stag do in Amsterdam. He is reluctant to say much about it, but his lascivious demeanour gives it away. He does make one comment about the girls' trip by pointing out to Melanie that the Twin Towers are the tallest building in New York, not the Empire State Building.

The taxi arrives and the girls leave in a flurry of excited goodbyes. Then the stage goes black, and we hear an aircraft passing overhead followed by an enormous explosion.

The lights go up and we see Jeremy and Connie comforting each other as they speculate about what has happened to the girls. Suddenly, they get a call from Cheryl who tells Connie that they were diverted from New York and have landed safely in Newfoundland, all is well.



Bride Before a Fall

Directed by Mark Chapman and written by Robert Scott, Bride Before a Fall has three characters: Victor, his wife Lottie and his Mistress Madelyn. Lottie and Madelyn are good friends, but Lottie is unaware that her husband is having an affair with Madelyn.

This is not a typical love triangle. It is about Lottie's money and Madelyn and Victor's various plans to get it. Victor, who needs prompting to do anything, becomes alarmed when he realises that Madelyn is intent on murder to get what she wants. He engages with these plans explaining that it is not easy to sleep with someone you intend to kill.

Whilst Madelyn is hatching numerous ways of getting rid of Lottie, Lottie herself is blithely arranging dates to give fulfilment to what she thinks is Madelyn's empty life. And she is not suspicious of the failure of her car's brakes.

Lottie is delighted when Victor and Madelyn arrange a birthday party for her. After the birthday cake explodes prematurely, Madelyn offers Lottie a drink which is spiked. Lottie declines and in desperation the two would be assassing grab the candlesticks that had been a wedding present and creep up behind Lottie with obvious intent to do the deed.

Lottie is unaware of what is about to happen. When she saw Victor carrying a large claw hammer, she was not suspicious. She is trying to resolve a clue in a crossword puzzle: industrial stoppage six letters. "Of course,", she shouts "Strike". At that moment, as if on cue, Victor and Madelyn raise the candlesticks above Lottie's head and as the stage goes black, we hear a clap of thunder and the sound of a siren.



Next, we see Madelyn and Victor standing in the spotlight seemingly at heaven's gate and, as they await judgement and inevitable eternity in hell. Victor cheerfully points out that they may be dead but at least they are alone together.

His mood is immediately changed when Lottie appears and announces in her still shrill tones that she is off to heaven, then adding "You're coming with me". For her, it is the perfect outcome: spending eternity with her two favourite people, who in turn will be punished by having to be with her forever.

CRANLEIGH LIONS PROJECT WENCESLAS

How would you feel if you had to choose between heating and eating ?


Money is not given to individuals – we make payment direct to energy companies or we top up pre-payment cards with cash.

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THE GARDEN IN JANUARY AND FEBRUARY

After the busy-ness at the end of a year - with the festive feasting and frivolity many of us are fortunate enough to enjoy - the 'fresh start' of a new year is a perfect time to reflect on many aspects of our lives. We may promise ourselves we're going to eat more healthily; do dry January; join a gym; achieve that work-life balance or spend more time with loved ones. For us gardeners, this 'pause' in the gardening year is a wonderful opportunity to take stock of the spaces we nurture. Whilst we all have different approaches to our gardens - for some, the joy is in research then seeking out particular plants yet for others, it's a more bohemian approach that may include taking pity on sad specimens in the garden centre that need a good home! Many of us are probably somewhere in between. Whatever your approach, January is a great month to take a bit of time to think about your garden and how it works for you and your family. Starting this year, why not take monthly photos of your garden, in various places, so that you can see how it evolves over the year in terms of spring bulbs, summer flowers, autumn colour, winter coverage and so on? It's a really useful resource, particularly when you're planting bulbs in the autumn and can't remember what was there last spring! Things you might like to think about include:

whether your garden currently works for you and your family. Where are the best areas to dine outside; relax and read a book; sunbathe; play with the kids; grow fruit and veg? Think about light and shade and how this changes over the year, as well as privacy and noise.

how to get more plants for free or certainly at less of a cost. Think beyond the garden centre. Look out for local plant sales at open gardens, village hall, village fairs. Ask friends and neighbours to share seeds, cuttings, clumps! Perhaps even try propagating your own or growing from seed. A lot of plants are far easier to grow than you think.

how you might improve your gardens positive impact on the environment by:

- improving its biodiversity in order to attract more pollinators and wildlife. Could you introduce a wider range of textures, shapes and colour in your plants? Could you add a small water feature, native hedging, plants and trees with fruits and berries, a nesting box? Could you develop a 're-wilded' area if you have enough space?
- buying only peat-free compost and using organic pest and disease control methods
- recycling and reusing garden plastics and other non-recyclables where possible

- collecting more rain water, either in water butts or other suitable large containers (that can also be used by wildlife).
- improving your compost area and introduce a simple wire structure for putting leaves to make leaf mulch.

If you grow you own fruit and veg, winter is a good time to plan what you are going to grow and where. Make sure to choose veg you will actually eat! Plan a rotation system to ensure the same crops are not grown in the same beds to help prevent disease build-up.

This winter hiatus provides a perfect opportunity for a good clean and sharpen of tools, as well as a tidy and sort of that green house and potting shed you've been meaning to do all year. You can get pots and seed trays ready for sowing, starting with sowing seed indoors (or in a heated greenhouse or propagator) for early crops like lettuce, summer brassicas (e.g. cabbages and cauliflowers), spinach, salad onions and turnips. From mid-February onwards, sow tomato and cucumber seed for greenhouse growing. Source your seed potatoes if you have not already done so. Save egg boxes as they will come in handy for chitting a little later on. You can also start to sow sweet peas indoors or in a greenhouse.

For when you do want to get out and active in your garden, there are always some jobs to do at this time of year. Many plants benefit from a winter prune, including established wisteria (shortening shoots that were summer pruned back to two to three buds). Also prune apple trees (not cordons), and currants and gooseberries need to be trimmed by about a third, cutting out crossing branches.

Moving through February, prune late-flowering (group 3) clematis, grasses, cornus and shrub roses. And unless the ground is frozen or waterlogged, January and February are good months to plant dormant deciduous shrubs and trees. Buying bare root plants at this time of year is often a good value option.

Finally, it's not too early to think about what you might want to enter for the Okewood, Ockley and Forest Green Summer Fair. The best traditional Summer Fair is, as always, in Okewood Hill on Saturday 9th August 2025.

Plant of the month – the humble Narcissus (daffodil). Apparently, there are almost 27,000 cultivars, which come in a dazzling array of shapes, sizes, and yellow, white & orange hues.




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WHERE THERE'S A WILL THERE'S A WAY

Where There's a Will There's a Way written by Gary Diamond and directed by Sylvie Beckett was performed in Ockley Village Hall on Friday 25th October and in Capel Memorial Hall on Saturday 26th October.

Inspired by an excellent harvest supper spread over two intervals, the enthusiastic audiences followed the plot of this amusing whodunnit and played the role of detective themselves to identify the culprits. In both cases, more than one team had the right answer. Well done.

For those who were not able to attend, here is a synopsis of the play:

Sir Reginald Stanley, womaniser and patriarch of a well to do family has died aged 103. His family sit expectantly as their solicitor Roger Peacock prepares to read the will.

He is interrupted by two strangers, Caspian Duke, an actor manqué and Norman Trumpton, a retired detective. Roger explains that they have come to monitor the reading of the will.

Caspian and Trumpton decide to interview the entire family. Tempest Stanley, Sir Reginald's granddaughter, admits to having a gun, while Robert Stanley, Sir Reginald's grandson admits to having an affair with Tricksy.

Meanwhile, Roger appears to speak to a certain Inspector Lestrade at Scotland Yard, but this is a deceit which Trumpton exposes.

They interview the cook, Mrs. Bascom and the butler Faversham. They are little help, preferring to reminisce about Sir Reginald until Faversham tells them that he has a key to the desk in which the gun is locked and that he knows who put it there.

Caspian and Trumpton dismiss Roger's preference to wait for the Police. Caspian goes on to accuse Purdy of murdering Deidre Tinker because she knew the contents of the will. Only Roger could have told her. Surprise, surprise, Roger and Purdy have been having an affair for some time.

Caspian unlocks the desk drawer and removes the gun. Roger grabs the gun and Purdy joins him and the couple attempt to make their getaway, until Caspian tells him that the gun is not loaded and Roger gives up.

With his usual false modesty, Caspian takes credit for unmasking the murderous pair, but Trumpton has the last word by revealing that the gun really was loaded. Caspian faints.






