



THE MANOR OF DORKING

A history of the Manor of Dorking has recently been published by the Dorking Museum. It covers the period from 1280 to 1380 AD. The research was possible because the Lord of the Manor (the Feudal Lord) was the Earl of Surrey, whose descendant is the Duke of Norfolk, and some of the records from that time have survived in the archives at Arundel! I presume they are written in abbreviated Latin and difficult to read!

Surnames were only just starting to be used, most names relate to the property where they lived although some relate to their occupation. There are no records of births, marriages or deaths from that time. Those records only start in the 16th century. Many of the property names are still in use today. A plan of the manor is included showing some locations!

The main source of information is the records of the Manor Court which was held every three weeks, usually on a Monday (the market days were Monday and Thursday). All customary tenants were required to attend, as well as those who owed duty/service to the Lord of the Manor for their holding. Other landowners attended if they had business for the court. The majority of information relates to fines being paid for failing to attend the court, for fighting, for leaving the Manor without permission, for poaching, for taking wood and for trespassing on the Lords own land. When the occupation of land passed from one person to another (I deliberately do not use the word ownership) money was paid to the Lord and a 'heriot' of the best beast transferred to the Lord's steward.

Once a year, another type of court was held called the View of Frankpledge. That dealt with petty quarrels between inhabitants, trade regulations such as the measures used to sell bread and beer, and repairs to public roads.

In 1307, a separate document called the Extent was made. This described the demesne (the Lord's land), a list of all the customary tenants and cottars, giving their names, their plots and all the payments and services they were expected to provide, and a list of the freeholders, their properties and the names of those from whom they had received them.

At the time of the Domesday Book about 200 years earlier, Dorking had 38 villans, 13 bordars (unfree peasants) and 4 slaves. There also seems to be land where the occupier owed no services to the feudal lord, essentially freehold. There was a church and 3 (possibly 4) mills. The manor belonged to King William, who had taken it from Queen Edith (King Harold's mother). William gave it to the Earl of Surrey (who also owned Ockley).

At the time of the Extent, there were 38 customary tenants and 17 cottars but no slaves. Slavery was abolished by the Normans. By 1365, there were

24 freeholders. It was possible for the Lord to sell land held by customary tenants (or cottars) as freeholds to raise money. Some freeholders held the land as an investment, letting it to tenants. Some were citizens of London, maybe having Dorking connections.

The area of the manor totalled some 7,000 acres and the Lord's land some 200 acres of arable (for crops), 30 acres of pasture, 12 acres of meadow and 230 acres of woodland.

A survey of the Manor in 1649 included a map and the assumption is made (in the book) that little had changed in the previous 300 years! The Manor stretched from the Dorking Gap in the North Downs to the north to the county boundary in the south and included Capel (which was named Ewekene) and Holmwood.

Strangely, the map shows a portion as part of the Manor of Ockley, to the west of Arnolds and east of Bearhurst. So, near the A29 bridge over the railway.

The service of the customary tenants only provided cultivation for a small proportion of the Lord's demesne and the Lord also employed workmen direct (a ploughman, harrower and warrener) paying about 5 shillings a year!

Indeed, by the 1380s almost all the services had been changed to cash payments.

Nicholas de Malemeyns was the Lord of the Manor of Ockley and was fined for straying out of his own land onto the Lord of the Dorking Manor's warren, presumably to catch rabbits.

De Malemeyns was granted the right to hold the assize of bread and ale and View of Frankpledge on his own manor as well as a market on Tuesdays and a fair on St Margaret's day. He also had 'free warren', the right to hunt small game on his own land, which may explain his trespass.

The Lord of the Manor had the money paid in fines and for the transfer of property, and also 'farmed out' the market and the two watermills. He received 'pannage' for allowing pigs to graze on the Holmwood. He also received payment in kind in 1299: 93 hens and 413 eggs from the customary tenants plus 6 capons, 4 sticks of eels (a stick was 25 dried or smoked eels) a pair of gilded spurs, 1lb of cumin and 2lb of pepper. The income the Lord received in the years where full accounts exist totalled some £140. But the expenses were some £100.

Nationally there were various events in this period. The weather in the last years of the 13th century was benign and there were bumper crops, but the first years of the 14th century were wet and there was famine across much of Europe. The Black Death arrived in England in 1348 and there were further outbreaks in 1361 and 1369, but there is little evidence of its

effects on Dorking in the court records. There is also no evidence of the Peasants Revolt of 1381, although there were events in Guildford.

There was no Manor House in Dorking, and the steward who represented the Lord of the Manor lived in Reigate Castle.

The book by Susannah Horne is available from Dorking Museum for £9.

THE EARLY SPRING GARDEN

Writing this in early February and so far, (fingers crossed!), our garden plants haven't suffered from consistent low temperatures like last winter. We've had some below zero temperatures but nothing like early 2023. Whilst gardening for clients today, I was shedding layers in this unseasonably warm start to the year, and even saw a bumblebee settle on some hot pink heather flowers.

You are bound to have noticed the many spring jewels already dotted around the countryside and in our gardens, some even earlier to the party than in previous years. These include alabaster snowdrops, canary-yellow aconites and early daffodils, purple crocus, sweet-smelling daphne and sarcococca (sweet box) and even some magenta pink camellia, flowering quince and amethyst blue muscari. There are plenty of other spring bulbs queuing up to join the fun, pushing their heads through the warming earth. However, whilst this leads us to believe that winter's grip is in decline, do bear in mind that early spring can be a fickle friend for many weeks yet.

Yet from this point onwards - slowly at first and then gaining momentum as the weeks pass - the garden reveals its kaleidoscope of treasures to us. We will see anemone blanda, iris, chionodoxa, primula, later flowering narcissi and hyacinths later on this month, into March and April. And of course, the rainbow array of tulips - always a joy to behold - alongside the cheerful brightness of forsythia, the carmine pinks and reds of later flowering camellia and then early flowering rhododendrons and azalea. If you didn't get a chance to plant bulbs in the autumn or buy any of the plants above that bring early spring colour, why not think of adding a few to your borders now. Although not the most cost-effective way to do it, you can buy pots of bulbs now. Snowdrops should always be moved when they're green so if you have friends with a glut in their gardens, they could perhaps spare a few clumps that have finished flowering. Whilst you won't get instantaneous colour, a good way of saving money is buying plants - or potted bulbs - from garden centres once they've finished flowering. They are often on offer or reduced and will fill gaps in your garden for next year.

Prepare. If you haven't already done so, it's time to turn the soil on veggie beds - removing stubborn weeds - and work in well-rotted manure/garden compost. Remember, don't put manure down for root crops (carrots, parsnips), which prefer the addition of sand to encourage deeper growth. Give a good covering of compost to raspberries, and blueberries (who prefer the ericaceous variety). 'Chit' early and maincrop potatoes to encourage stem growth, in old egg boxes on a windowsill or in a greenhouse, ready to plant out in April. Prepare bean trenches and collect or buy supports for beans and peas ready for May planting. Propagate flowers from seed for a glorious summer display in late March and April, making sure half-hardy varieties are started off in a heated greenhouse, propagator or on a windowsill. Some of you might like to try include sweetpeas, cosmos, cleome, antirrhinum (snapdragons) and zinnia. Alternatively, buy plug plants and grow them on. Sow tomato, cucumber and pepper seeds indoors, and broad beans, carrots, parsnips, beetroot, onions, lettuces, radish, peas, spinach in pots in a cold greenhouse or cold frame. Label carefully if you have a lot on the go!

Prune wisteria and grape vines (no later than March); and with sharp secateurs, start or continue to prune shrub and English roses back by a third, removing all dead wood, and give hybrid tea roses a much tougher prune. If you're unsure what rose you have, cut back by no more than a half! Cornus and salix, with stems grown for winter colour, need cutting back by the end of March. Almost all hydrangeas should be pruned in early Spring (except for climbing hydrangeas). Prune mop head and lace caps lightly as they produce flowers on older wood. Paniculata and arborescens (including the popular 'Annabelle') can be pruned harder to a lower pair of healthy buds.

Plant lily bulbs and other summer bulbs, such as begonias tubers; bare root roses can still be planted, and it's a great time to add new perennials to your borders. Early March is a good time to divide perennials (not yet in active growth): choose a day when the soil is dry and dig up the plant with a fork; split into smaller parts using a knife or spade; make sure the 'new' plants are replanted in a border or pot and watered straight away. Plant sharing with neighbours and friends is a cost-effective way to expand the plants in your garden (just ensure they don't come with any invasive weeds such as ground elder!). Early potatoes should be planted out in late March, second earlies in the first half of April, then main crop in the second half. It's also the right time to plant onions, shallots and garlic.

Plants of the Season

Willow trees, such as Salix caprea Kilmarnock, whose drooping branches are festooned with soft yellow catkins, provide interest in gardens of all sizes. Later, Clematis Alpina, with its delicate bell-shaped flowers, is an asset to any garden, as are the beautiful heart-shaped flowers of Lamprocampnos (previously Dicentra!) spectabilis.

And finally, make sure that the 2024 Okewood, Ockley & Forest Green Summer Fair and Flower Show is firmly in your diaries! It's on Saturday 10th August. Why not start planning what to plant to produce prizewinning vegetables and beautiful flowers to fill the show marquee? Visit the website **okewoodhillflowershow.co.uk** which has lots of information about the show.

NEWS FROM THE BELFRY Muffles

When we rang half-muffled for the Remembrance Sunday Service last November, three of the muffles were found to be severely worn with holes right through. The muffle is a leather pad strapped to the clapper to soften the sound it

makes when striking the bell. Ringing half-muffled is so-called because the pad only covers one side of the clapper head, resulting in alternate loud, unmuffled blows and soft, muffled blows. All the bells sound loud for one row and then soft for the next. The result is a melancholic sound, a bit like an echo, which is also used for funerals, if requested, as an alternative to



tolling a single bell. Ringing fully muffled is reserved only for ringing on the death of a monarch as we did in 2022 for the late Queen Elizabeth II, when pads were fixed to both sides of the clapper.

Presumably the extended ringing on muffles for the Royal Funeral had paid its toll despite a lot of preparatory work to renovate the elderly leather pads, as can be seen in this picture.

New muffles are surprisingly expensive and so we looked to get them repaired if possible. The obvious solution seemed to be a local saddler if we could find one. Then one of our ringers suggested trying a boot repair shop



and so Jo and Graham took them to Cranleigh Cobblers. Neil the cobbler was very interested in the muffles as he had never been asked to do this kind of work before. He said they would need 9 iron leather, which is the thickest, and he quoted just £15 a muffle. They were ready a week later, as good as new, double stitched all the way round. His workmanship is another example of a traditional skill that is gradually disappearing.

Bellringing is an art which has developed and passed from generation to generation in Britain for over 300 years. It is a wonderful blend of sport, music, exercise, friendship, a challenge of wits and skill which gives great satisfaction when it goes right. Practice nights are at St. Margaret's in Ockley, on Wednesday evenings from 7.45 to 9.15, except first Wednesdays when we are at St John's in Capel.
