Local Businesses Collaborate for a Greener Community

In a heart warming example of community spirit and environmental awareness, Wayne Hanson, Director of UK Solar Power Panels and James and Catherine Dampier joint proprietors of Village Greens Farm Shop come together to support the community, environment and each other's businesses. UK Solar Power Panels recently powered Village Greens Farm Shop with solar energy and battery storage. What follows are their individual accounts of going solar!

James

I set up Village Greens Farm Shop with my wife Catherine in 2007 to supply "local food to local people". We named it Village Greens: "Village" to reflect the local, community aspect of the shop, and "Greens" to reflect both fresh vegetables and being environmentally responsible.



Wayne

UK Solar Power Panels began in 2011. Fifteen years is a record seldom met by competitors! We're committed to solar energy, specialising in off grid systems and self sufficiency. Our directorship hasn't changed and we've not diversified into other businesses. We are here to support the community far into the future.

James - What made you invest in solar panels?

We have always been conscious of our carbon footprint and try to reduce Food Miles. We grow produce ourselves and source as locally as possible, using 60 producers based within 20 miles of the shop. We had been looking at solar for some time, but after the price shock following Russia's invasion of Ukraine we felt we had to do something and stop being so reliant on fossil fuels.

Wayne – What interested you in solar power?

I joined my father's construction company as a roofer and then later became a certified electrician. Solar installation seemed to fit these two skills. Solar power fits my environmental ethos but also solar energy allows people to become energy self sufficient and creates a passive income.

How did you decide about the installation design?

James - We started looking at roof space for the panels, but realised there was none suitable. Therefore, we looked at ground mounted options. Following various discussions we found a location that was of a suitable size and aspect and as unobtrusive as possible, bordering a large polytunnel. Wayne found a new design of ground mountings he thought would be suitable. Once we'd decided the size, location and look of the installation Wayne created plans for the design which we submitted to the landlord.

Wayne - To give James and Catherine the greatest return on their investment, we needed the largest system the national grid would allow for a single phase system. Mindful we were working near polytunnels, the mounting array had to suit the topography, with minimal impact to the environment. After discussions with the manufacturers we decided to use it. Fortunately we have a close relationship with our suppliers and can pass savings onto our customers.

How easy was the installation process?

James - After obtaining landlord approval, we needed permission from the National Grid to connect the system, the District Network Operator (DNO). Wayne made the application on our behalf. It took about 3 months for permission to be granted.

After that it was plain sailing, and took one month from starting work to being online. That included site clearing and preparation, building a "Power Room" for the inverters and batteries (Wayne organised contractors and oversaw this), installing ground mounts, panels, digging required trenches and laying underground cables between panels and the Power Room, and making final electrical connections between the new installation, Grid and shop. Disruption to the shop was minimal, just a short interruption to the power supply when the final connection was made.

Wayne - Everything went as planned. The materials arrived punctually and our trained installers and electricians made sure we stayed on track. We were also blessed with good weather!

How do you feel supporting a local business/working together to help local community?

James - Local is extremely important to us: we always look for a local supplier first.

Wayne - 80% of our business is local and always our priority. We will travel, especially when we're recommended by word of mouth. We are also happy to undertake complex installations further afield.

How soon did you notice a positive impact?

James - The installation has been live for three months. We have been totally self-sufficient on several days, despite many short, dark days. Overall our costs have reduced by about one third, and we've probably reduced our carbon footprint by nearly 2.5 tonnes.

After storm Darragh had devastated the country, there was a general power cut in the local area. We were able to trade uninterrupted thanks to power stored in the batteries. That meant our fridges and freezers ran, so no loss of chilled stock, and the lights and tills stayed on, no loss of trade! The installation has been worth it just for that!

Final comments?


James - It was a pleasure working with Wayne. I recommend him to others considering solar. If that's you, I would be happy to show you our installation.

Wayne - I consider myself very lucky running a company helping many customers that are now friends.





IN2DRAMA

In2Drama launches its 2025 Summer Academy at the Cranleigh Arts Centre

On Wednesday 4th December, there was a rather special event at the Cranleigh Arts Centre. It was called *A Short Night at the Movies* and on the bill were two world premieres: *Classy Future*, the film-in-a-week made by In2Drama's students at last year's academy in July; and the edited version of *An Evening with Kerry Ellis and Friends*, the concert Kerry Ellis gave to round off the academy week. In the audience were many of the performers, tech teams and coaches who made the two films happen, so there really couldn't have been a better occasion to launch the 2025 In2Drama Summer Academy.

If you're not familiar with In2Drama, I created the Academy five years ago for every young aspiring actor, singer, dancer or technician who dreams of forging a career in the performing arts. Held at the Cranleigh Arts Centre, Cranleigh, Surrey, the academy offers students aged 11-21 over 35 hours of masterclasses with industry professionals as well as workshops and 1-2-1 advice.

During my career – which has taken me from working as an Assistant Producer at Sky Sports to my current position as Head of Drama at Cranleigh Prep School – I've seen how giving young students the opportunity to interact with and learn from industry experts can work wonders. Not only do they develop faster, they also have a lot of fun along the way.

Many of the professionals who have been such an integral part of In2Drama over the years will be returning in 2025. They include:

Kerry Ellis

Celebrated singer and actress Kerry Ellis is well-known for her leading roles in the West End and on Broadway. She has played Elphaba in *Wicked* on both sides of the pond, and is even in the new movie. As In2Drama's Ambassador she is returning to the academy for the fourth time to teach a singing masterclass – and four students from the class will be selected to take part in *An Evening with Kerry Ellis and Friends* on the final evening of the academy. This will be Kerry's second annual concert with In2Drama and will include a personal selection of popular songs, many from musical theatre. The show is expected to sell out again and tickets will be available soon. Sign up to the In2Drama newsletter at www.in2drama.com to be the first to know.

Phoebe Hyder

Puppeteer and Movement Coach Phoebe Hyder is returning to the academy for the third time. Her work spans award-winning theatre, film, TV, voice over, gaming and ground-breaking Motion/Performance capture.

Edward Bennett

Actor Edward Bennett is also returning to the academy to teach an Acting Masterclass. Edward's credits in film, television and the theatre are too numerous to mention, but his Shakespearian work is most notable. particularly standing in for David Tennant to play Hamlet in the RSC's production at the Novello Theatre.

Richard van't Riet

Richard is a BAFTA Award-winning director with over 30 years' experience in television, directing shows such as Pointless, A League of their Own, The Cube and Tipping Point. In 2025, Richard will be leading our Film and TV Production Modules.

New for 2025 - Boarding

Sayers Croft is set within 56 acres of woodland and meadows and has a wide range of activities on offer, including archery, wall climbing and rope courses as well as an outdoor swimming pool. The centre is fully staffed with experienced and DBS-checked experts.

Boarding for five nights will cost £375 per student and includes: All linen, Breakfast and dinner, Experienced House Parents, Transport to and from Cranleigh Arts Centre, Common Room for Students with TV.

Ages and genders will be split up and each room will house no more than three students. Fach room has an ensuite bathroom.

Evening activities are optional extras and will last for an hour after dinner. We will supply more details about the activities in due course. The cost for each activity may vary depending on the level of interest.

OLD AGE ISN'T FOR THE FAINT HEARTED

My parents were of the uncomplaining generation and charmingly but determinedly independent, which was a good thing as they lived on the North Norfolk coast, not an area rich in services for the elderly. As daily living became an increasing challenge, Mum would sometimes comment with a resigned and characteristic chuckle: 'We didn't expect to still be around by now.'

Their house would definitely not have passed any modern safety tests and the fuse box was high up on the wall in their downstairs shower room. Fuses blew regularly. 'No problem,' said Mum. 'I climb onto the loo seat, then I can reach.' She was then in her late eighties and couldn't walk far at all but had always been proud of her flexibility. 'Mum, that really isn't safe,' I would say firmly. 'It is fine. I hold onto the towel rail with one hand and put the other on Dad's shoulder.' In the dark! I imagine that my even more unstable father must have held a torch.

I now have their old VW Golf, which can often be seen around the WOOF roads, looking a bit like a stock racing car, it has so many dents. They were all put there by my parents (honest, not me), who continued to drive long after they should. They were in a Catch 22 situation. They needed the car to get to doctors' appointments, get shopping (and meet up with their equally determined and increasingly fragile friends) but that actually disbarred them from accessing medical help. The doctor arranged for the district nurse to visit one day. When she arrived, my mother was out at the shops and returned to a furious nurse, who said that she was not allowed to attend patients who could still drive. 'Drive' would have been more accurate but of course there was huge demand for the district nurse's help and she felt that Mum had wasted her time. My mother would never have confessed to her desperation, as her aging body really was giving up on her, until finally the doctor came round and admitted her to hospital, who refused to release her unless she had 'proper care' at home, which led to her and my father coming, very reluctantly, to the Old Rectory in Ewhurst for what turned out to be just her final six months, where she was beautifully cared for, and spent hours on the telephone advising her friends to come and join her. Fruitlessly; her best friend told me that she threatened the rest of their Norfolk gang with 'being kidnapped by their children and whisked away to darkest Surrey,' if they didn't take all their medicine properly.

Recently I have been talking to elderly neighbours in this area and learnt that a car is essential to independence here too.

So now I am on a bit of a mission to find out what services she, or others, might not know about around here. One has used the Wasp Community Bus, which she says is brilliant, no charge, just a voluntary donation and very helpful drivers. It goes to Tesco, Broadbridge Heath, on the first and

third Tuesday of every month, leaving Forest Green at approximately 2.00 pm, Walliswood at 2.10 and Okewood Hill at 2.15. Potential passengers need to ring 07802 460069.

There is also a new bus service, the Connect Bus, which seems a very creative idea from Surrey Council. It is a method of community transport. You have to be able to go online to register, via *www.surreyconnect.org.uk* You give the details of the journey you want to undertake and it then links you with other travellers wanting roughly the same time and route. And, presumably if there is sufficient demand, a fully wheelchair accessible minibus will arrive at your door. A neighbour who is having to stop driving for the moment and I are going to try it out and see if we can go to Dorking for a cup of coffee. I wonder if I can take my dog on the outing too?

Dial A Ride (0300 123 7749) covers this area for 'those with mobility issues needing medical appointments and suchlike'.

I know too that Simon Figg has faithfully coordinated lift givers and liftees (01306 627094).

And of course there are neighbours. My parents were immensely grateful to their immediate neighbours in their Norfolk village, and they knew each other well in a country neighbourly sort of a way. I remember on one visit up there offering to go and buy my parents their daily newspaper. 'No, don't,' I was told. 'Keith next door always gets it for us and he was most upset when Peter (the neighbour on the other side) tried to help with that as well.' That, I think, is country living. Long may it continue thus!

THE EARLY SPRING GARDEN 2025

Whilst we have had some low temperatures and frosts so far this year, our garden plants don't seem to have suffered unduly. The same can't be said for us gardeners who are getting rather worn down by grey days and the lack of crisp sunshiney days in recent months. We've had some blue skies but they've been few and far between. Vitamin D supplements should be on everyone's shopping list! And as the sun wasn't around much in 2024, fingers crossed we see a lot more of it in 2025.

You may have started to notice the many spring jewels that are emerging around the countryside and in our gardens, though they're perhaps a little slower to peep through the soil this year. Alabaster snowdrops, crocus and butter-yellow primroses have already made an appearance, and daffodils are everywhere, the greeny-yellow buds ready to burst if they haven't already. The subtle perfumes of sarcococca (sweet box) and daphne are in the air, and a plethora of spring bulbs are waiting in the wings - aconites, muscari, chinodoxa. But whilst it feels that winter's grip is on the wane, do bear in mind that early spring can be a fickle friend for many weeks yet. Yet from this point onwards, our gardens and the countryside around us begin to reveal their treasures. In a few weeks time, look out for anemone blanda, iris, later flowering narcissi and hyacinths. We very much know that spring has arrived with the cheery yellow of forsythia, the carmine pinks, reds and whites of camellia and early flowering rhododendrons and azalea. Then as days get longer and warmer, the joy that is the 'tulip season' will be upon us.

If we could recommend one thing to our readers, it would be planting bulbs in the autumn and winter. You often forget what you've planted and where but then - just like getting a lovely gift through the post - they are such a welcome surprise!

Thinking ahead to next year, a good money-saver is buying these plants – or potted bulbs - once they've finished flowering and are discounted. This is a great way to fill gaps for next year. Remember that snowdrops should always be moved when they're 'in the green' so if you have friends who could spare a few clumps, do this once they have finished flowering.

Prepare. You may be one of the many who are adopting the no-dig method of vegetable gardening. If you haven't yet heard about Charles Dowding, visit his website at *charlesdowding.co.uk* to find out if this might be something you could adopt. Otherwise, it's time to turn the soil on veggie beds - removing stubborn weeds - and work in well-rotted manure/garden compost. Remember, don't put manure down for root crops (carrots, parsnips), which prefer the addition of sand to encourage deeper growth. Give a good covering of compost to raspberries, and blueberries (who prefer the ericaceous variety). 'Chit' early and main crop potatoes to encourage stem growth, in old egg boxes on a windowsill or in a

greenhouse, ready to plant out in April. Prepare bean trenches and collect or buy supports for beans and peas ready for May planting.

Propagate flowers from seed for a glorious display in late March/April, making sure half-hardy varieties are started off in a heated greenhouse, propagator or on a windowsill. Some you might like to try include sweetpeas, cosmos, cleome, antirrhinum (snapdragons) and zinnia. Alternatively, buy plug plants and grow them on. Sow tomato, cucumber and pepper seeds indoors, and broad beans, carrots, parsnips, beetroot, onions, lettuces, radish, peas, spinach in pots in a cold greenhouse or cold frame. Label carefully if you have a lot on the go!

Prune Wisteria and grape vines (no later than March); and with sharp secateurs, start or continue to prune shrub and English roses back by a third, removing all dead wood, and give hybrid tea roses a much tougher prune. If you're unsure what rose you have, cut back by no more than a half! Cornus and salix, with stems grown for winter colour, need cutting back by the end of March. Almost all hydrangeas should be pruned in early spring (except for climbing hydrangeas). Prune mop head and lace caps lightly as they produce flowers on older wood. Paniculata and arborescens (including the popular 'Annabelle') can be pruned harder to a lower pair of healthy buds.

Plant lily bulbs and other summer bulbs, such as begonias tubers; bare root roses can still be planted, and it's a great time to add new perennials to your borders. Early March is a good time to divide perennials (not yet in active growth): choose a day when the soil is dry and dig up the plant with a fork; split into smaller parts using a knife or spade; make sure the 'new' plants are replanted in a border or pot and watered straight away. Plant sharing with neighbours and friends is a cost-effective way to expand the plants in your garden (just ensure they don't come with any invasive weeds such as ground elder!) Early potatoes should be planted out in late March, second earlies in the first half of April then main crop in the second half. It's also the right time to plant onions, shallots and garlic.

The Okewood, Ockley & Forest Green Summer Fair and flower show is on Saturday August 9th this year and now is the time to plan which vegetables you would like to exhibit. You will need to time your sowing and planting so that you have the freshest and healthiest results at show time. Some need to be started off early in a greenhouse or a windowsill, such as tomatoes, sweet peppers and chillies; carrots and beetroot should be sown outside in March as soon as the soil warms up; squash and marrows will need to be started by April; peas and beans can be sown indoors in April and then planted out after the threat of frost had gone, and will hopefully be in ready in time for the show as will courgettes although you will need to keep an eye on them. Whatever you decide to enter, look out for the 2025 schedule which will be delivered with your WOOF in early summer and will also be available online at



Ringing Meetings

We have two Saturday ringing meetings a month locally, one for each of the ringing groups we belong to and these are a good opportunity to visit other towers and ring with different people. The annual business meetings are both in February and these are always preceded by a ringing session and

followed by a ringers' tea with sandwiches and plenty of cake to help refuel.

In February we visited Leatherhead church, home tower of our Guildford Guild Leatherhead district. This is a ten bell church which is a good experience for those of us used to six bells. The Southern District meeting of the Surrey Association is also at a ten bell tower later in February, at Reigate. Also in our area, Dorking, Epsom and Bletchingley are towers with ten bells.

There are a number of factors to consider when ringing on ten bells instead of six. There are four more moving ropes to identify when looking to see who you are ringing after which can be confusing at first. The ringing areas tend to be a lot larger making it more difficult to hear instructions from the conductor. The greatest difference is in the timing because the speed at which a bell swings is a matter of mechanics and does not alter to accommodate a different number of bells. Instead the ringers must ring slower to hold up the smaller bells to allow time for all the heavier back bells to turn in sequence. The bells sound quicker because the gaps between the bells has to be smaller to allow the ten bells to turn in the same time that six or eight would take.

There are a lot more variations in method ringing possible with a higher numbers of bells, many being a simple extension by adding extra dodges or places and they take longer to ring a course than on six bells, with more leads before the bells come back into rounds.

Bellringing is an enjoyable pastime, open to everyone and probably not what you expect. Come along and be surprised! Anyone interested in finding out more is welcome to come along and have a go, under supervision, or just to watch. Practice nights are at St Margaret's Ockley on Wednesday evenings from 7.45pm to 9pm.

OAKWOOD CHAPEL

Manning and Bray's 'History and Antiquities of the Country of Surrey' published in 1809, has a long article about Oakwood Chapel. It reads as follows:

A considerable number of the inhabitants of those parts as well as of Abinger and Ewhurst living a great distance from their Parish Churches, and in the country below Leith Hill where the deepness of the clay makes travelling in winter extremely difficult, a Chapel was built in the very early times near Okewood Hill in the lower part of Wotton near the borders of Sussex for the convenience of the inhabitants in that part. It is dedicated to St John Baptist. It was in being in in 1290 when Sir Walter de Fancourt presented a Priest to the Chantry here. It was further endowed by Edward de la Hale, who seems to have lived at what is still called Hale House, in the parish of Ockley by the side of Stanstreet Causeway and near the Chapel. It was however considered as belonging to the Rector of Wotton and was in the patronage of Thomas Lord Camoys in 1422. The lands given by Hale were seized in the time of King Edward VI, under pretence of having been given to superstitious use, and were granted to..... In 1673 they belonged to Mrs Harvey, relict of John Harvey, sometime Treasurer to the Queen Dowager of King Charles I. at that time the Chapel was gone to great decay: but, in 1709, Mr Goffe and Mr Haynes two neighbouring yeoman, sold the three bells belonging to it, and with that money, and about 81 more, caused it to be repaired and strengthened with buttresses, and it has been kept in good repair ever since. Queen Elizabeth in the third year of her reign, settled a stipend of 3I 6s 8d on the Curate, payable at the Exchequer, which continued to be the only provision he had till 1723, when Sir John Evelyn, the Patron, and Richard Miller Esq. gave £200 and thereby obtained Queen Anne's bounty. In 1725 Dr Godolphin, Dean of St Paul's and Sir William Perkins of Chertsey in this county, gave each £100 and obtained a

further augmentation . Mr Offley , Rector of Abinger, by his will dated 9 December 1741, devised two farms to Sir John Evelyn Bart one called Steepwood or Steeplands in Chittington in the County of Sussex and the other called Hadfold in Billingshurst in that County, formerly part of the possessions of the dissolved Priory of Torrington in the said County of Sussex(subject to a mortgage that Mr Offley had made thereof, and to two annuities for lives of the parties, with which he charged his estate) upon trust out of the rents to keep the Chapel at Oakwood in good and sufficient repair; and then upon trust to pay the surplus of the rents, or the whole as it may happen, to the Curate or Chaplain for the time being of this chapel, and his successors, they performing their duty and office by preaching once, and reading divine service, according to the Liturgy of the Church of England twice every Sunday in the year in this Chapel; and if the curate should not , by himself or some other Minister of the Church of England do such duty, he should forfeit all rights to the rents and advantages of these estates; and the trustees for the time being should pay the rents and profits to some other Minister of the Church of England, to be appointed by them under the restrictions aforesaid: and he directed that £200 should be raised by the sale of timber from these farms, and laid out in the purchase of land, and settled to the use of the Curate. And he directed that Sir John Evelyn should convey these estates to the use of himself and four others (the Rectors of Wotton and Abinger to be always of the number), upon trust for the purpose aforesaid, and when the number be reduced to three, that new Trustees should be appointed. Mr Offley died in 1743 and Sir John Evelyn conveyed the farms accordingly, and raised £200 as directed in the will with which with the other donations above mentioned, and the assistance of the Governors of Queen Anne's Bounty, a farm was purchased in 1743, called Green Dean in the Parish of East Horsley in this County, then let at about 241 per annum. In 1795, this farm was exchanged with William Currie Esq. of East Horsley, for one called East Parkland, situated near the Chapel. The Trust has been from time to time renewed and stock in the 3% Consolidated Annuities has been bought for the Chapel with money from the sale of timber from these farms. The Chapel is kept in good repair. But the service on Sunday in the afternoon in the winter half year has been discontinued by the present possessor of the Chapel, till whose time it was always regularly performed, and well attended.

There is a footnote saying the details of the Queen Elizabeth (II) stipend are carved on stone on the wall.

It is interesting that the distinction is made between the name of the village (Okewood) and the name of the Chapel.

Queen Anne's Bounty was a scheme to supplement the stipends of clergy in poorer parishes.

The subject of Church finances is very complicated, and I will try to write an article for a future magazine.

OCKLEY SPEEDWATCH NEEDS YOU!

How often do we all notice vehicles being driven at excessive speed through the village, thinking 'something ought to be done...'?

The Speedwatch scheme evolved from this thought and aimed to fill a gap that the police had neither the resources nor the money for. As a result, there are Speedwatch teams all over the country helping the police by monitoring the traffic and reporting drivers who exceed the speed limit. The objective is to educate about the dangers of speeding rather than punish motorists.

We are a small team, and we need more volunteers so that we can monitor the A29 in Ockley at least once each day of the week. Do read on and find out more about what we do.

How do we do it?

We are organised into teams of two people who stand at the roadside for one-hour sessions. Using a speed gun, one identifies speeding drivers and calls out the seven pieces of information about the offence which their partner records in a



table that can be later uploaded to the national police database.

What is the result?

In 2024, Ockley Speedwatch reported 1869 drivers speeding, 39 cars without MoT and 61 with no tax. Each offender received a letter from the police, which seems to be an effective deterrent as only 3.5% of them reoffended. Not only that, our regular appearance at the roadside also acts as a deterrent. We are convinced that we are contributing to a safer A29 in Ockley.

Why join us?

We are all volunteers, and we give our time when we can. Ideally, each of us participates in one-hour long session each week. Before starting, we provide each new volunteer with detailed training ending with certification which the police recognise. Each session is preauthorised by the police who provide third party insurance as well as the essential high-vis jacket.



NEWS FROM CAGNE

What's the situation with Gatwick's new runway, airspace change, and what is the impact for us?



The Committee on Climate Change was clear in its report to Parliament in 2024 – there should be no airport expansions until a national framework is in place to control the growth of aviation emissions.

Gatwick Airport applied for a new runway using the planning process of a Development Consent Order (DCO) – the hearings for this took place last year. The recommendation by the Planning Inspectorate is now with the Secretary of State for Transport (Heidi Alexander MP) for her consideration. The airport and stakeholders had until 17th January to respond to further queries.

The SoS is due to make her decision on 27th February. However, as Luton Airport's decision (with fewer changes) has been delayed until April, CAGNE hopes Gatwick's decision will also be delayed, giving time for more fundraising.

Thanks to generous donations, CAGNE has put together a strong legal team of a senior climate change Kings Counsel, planning barrister, and qualified experts in surface transport, aviation noise and air quality. It was imperative to have a sufficiently qualified team to challenge Gatwick at the hearings and through submissions.

Gatwick's lengthy documents for the new runway were somewhat disingenuous with the facts, as with the misinterpretation of government policy 'to make best use of existing runway'. All had to be challenged – this is a new runway by the backdoor, with none of the financial commitments that Heathrow is having to offer with a new runway.

If it is a Yes from the Labour government, our legal team is ready, as there are so many reasons to challenge with a Judicial Review – not least, the planet's wellbeing and that of residents of Sussex, Surrey and Kent.

Airspace change (FASIS) was not permitted in the DCO but, if Gatwick is to operate two runways, it is needed (in our opinion) to meet their forecasts and not cause more delays.

The public FASIS consultation has been delayed until 2027, but this hasn't stopped Gatwick from continuing to redesign the airspace for maximum growth and efficiency. The government body (ACOG) identified the south of Gatwick for airspace growth, so this will be changed first, followed by the north (not necessarily used by the new runway).

Another tier of government organisation is being proposed to ensure that airspace change goes through but, sadly, any CO2 (and other environmental) savings will be lost with more planes flying.

The predictions are that ¾ of aviation fuel will still be fossil fuel in 2040 and

beyond. The previous government set mandatory SAF (so-called Sustainable Aviation Fuel) use of 22% by 2040, as well as five production plants (none built or financed yet). However, SAF is not available in the vast quantities required by aviation. The problems are a lack of base material, the intense power required to produce it (sufficient green power not available), and delivery must be by road.

SAF produces similar emissions to fossil fuel when burned, and contrails are not accounted for in any greenhouse gas figures. The uncomfortable truth is that the rise in emissions from airport expansions will almost entirely remove any reductions offered by SAF. Other alternative fuels are either still on the drawing board or create more issues for the planet than they solve.

SURREY COUNCIL'S CALL ON RESIDENTS TO RECYCLE THEIR FOOD WASTE

Last year, Surrey residents recycled over 37,000 tonnes of food waste, the equivalent of almost 3,000 double-decker buses! Food waste recycling services across the county have gone from strength to strength, with many residents incorporating food recycling into their daily routine and presenting their caddy regularly for collection.

Research by the Surrey Environment Partnership (SEP) found that 90% of residents have used their food caddy recently or plan to in the future. If all food waste was recycled in Surrey, it could save a further £4.9 million per year, which could then be used to fund other essential local services and help provide power to thousands more households annually.

SEP's latest campaign calls on local residents to follow in their neighbour's footsteps and start recycling their food waste. With free weekly food waste collections throughout Surrey, it is never too late to start.

Residents can simply contact their local council today to request a caddy. All food scraps and leftovers including meat, bones, eggshells and tea bags can go into the caddy, which should be presented on the usual bin collection day. Caddies can be kept clean and fresh by using plastic bags such as old shopping bags, pedal bin liners or even repurposed bread bags.

SEP Chair Marisa Heath said: 'It has never been easier to own your impact and make a difference. I strongly encourage all residents to take advantage of their free weekly collection and caddy any food they can't eat. It's a quick and easy way you can help the planet from home.'

There's no upper age limit and some people prefer to exercise sitting down and that's all catered for. The current age range starts at roughly sixty years.






